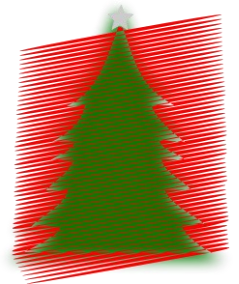

## A Few Facts about Tanzania and Malawi

Paul and Amelia Adams will spend 7 weeks in Malawi and Tanzania, Africa, this September and October to work with the Marion Medical Mission and their shallow well project. In honor of the work they are preparing to do, here is some information about these two unique countries. Please note that all information and pictures are taken from the CIA World Factbook website (<https://www.cia.gov/library/publications/the-world-factbook/index.html>).

### Tanzania

Location: Tanzania borders the Indian Ocean between Kenya and Mozambique.  
How big is Tanzania? Tanzania is slightly larger than twice the size of California.  
What are the main languages? Kiswahili/Swahili, English, Arabic, and local languages.

What is the population? 49,639,138 people

Total population with access to improved drinking water: 53.2%

Total population with access to unimproved drinking water: 46.8% (2012 estimate)

Bonus Fact: Tanzania is the location of Mount Kilimanjaro, the highest point in Africa.

### Malawi

Location: Malawi is located east of Zambia and west and north of Mozambique.

How big is Malawi? Malawi is slightly smaller than Pennsylvania.

What are the main languages? English and Chichewa

What is the population: 17,377,468 people

Total population with access to improved drinking water: 85%

Total population with access to unimproved drinking water: 15% (2012 est.)

Bonus Fact: Malawi's Lake Nyasa contains more fish species than any other lake on earth.

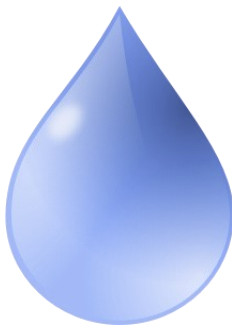

- ⇒ The average person makes less than 41 cents a day—that is why they need our help.
- ⇒ UNICEF reports that 4,000 children worldwide die each day because of unsafe water.
- ⇒ Over 14 million people in the rural areas of Malawi and Tanzania do not have access to safe drinking water.
- ⇒ The largest source of disease in Africa is unsafe drinking water.
- ⇒ The average woman walks 4 miles to collect water each day.
- ⇒ **Without any other medical intervention, providing safe drinking water could save 2 million lives a year.**
